MANAGER'S REPORT

Kath Boyd Big Brothers Big Sisters of Hawke's Bay Programme Manager

It is with sadness and a sense of accomplishment that I write my final report as Programme Manager for Big Brothers Big Sisters of Hawke's Bay (BBBS). The past four years have been an incredible journey, from joining as a Mentor Coordinator in a team of two (Patricia and Bonnie L) and 35 mentoring matches to building a team of five, and providing 101 youth with a mentor. I will carry with me the better part of 1460 days of memories; the good times shared with mentors, and mentees and the special stories that made the team laugh and moved us to tears.

The programme will be in good hands, with Hayley Burnett taking up the reins. Hayley joined us in 2022 as a Mentor Coordinator. She brings a wealth of experience to the role and is a qualified and experienced teacher. Hayley and her husband Alan have, in the past, fostered tamariki and have hands-on experience working with and supporting taiohi / young people in need.

I would like to give special thanks to Patricia who saw the vision of BBBS in 2017, and as our Board of Trustees like to say, we started off with \$5,000 in the bank and two leaky canoes. Patricia has been a rock to BBBS, she's mentored me and gladly shared her wisdom and humour! Over the past two years, Patricia has worked hard to grow our match sponsorship programme. We now have 35 matches sponsored - nearly half of our current matches.

Bridget continues to be a superstar in the administration and funding area, having submitted 30 applications in the last financial year alone. Bridget's eye for detail and dedication means we can keep igniting youth potential by matching young people with mentors.

Last year Bonnie G and Olivia joined the team as Mentor Coordinators. They have worked hard at building relationships and getting to know our mentors and mentees so they can provide professional support to matches.

Our Trustees bring their own unique backgrounds and skills to the governance table. Thank you, Alasdair, Ben, Jason, Jane, Boydy, Craig and Alex, and past board members Lyn and Louise, for your guidance and support over the last four years.

After the continued disruption of COVID-19, life had begun to settle, and then in February 2023, we faced the challenge of Cyclone Gabrielle. Due to the time of the day, we were fortunate none of our matches were out and about together. However, several of our matches were directly impacted and lost everything. We acknowledge the devastation Cyclone Gabrielle has wrought on our community and the long road to recovery we share.

As soon as communications were back up and running, our team checked in on all our families and mentors. Bonnie, Olivia, Bridget and Patricia all stepped up to navigate these, oftentimes difficult, conversations as the impact on heart and home was felt far and wide. During March, we visited nearly all the region's schools and social workers outlining how our service could be of benefit to the taiohi in our community, for we know the trauma suffered may not have immediate effects, but will show up in the long term. We touch more on this significant event on page 13.

I give a heartfelt thanks to our mentors, they truly are the backbone of BBBS. Over the last 12 months, these volunteers have spent approximately 7,500 hours with their mentees! That is a truly selfless investment in Hawke's Bay's tamariki and rangitahi; our future.

I thank our taiohi for being open to participating in the BBBS programme and to our parents and kaitiaki for trusting us to place their tamariki with another adult to walk alongside them on their journey.

During my tenure at BBBS we have had 10 matches reach a milestone of four years, and three of five years or longer. This is truly outstanding and is a testament to the value our community sees in mentoring our young people. I am excited about what the future holds, as BBBS is still a young organisation with much potential.

To those who support us financially; our funders, sponsors and donors, and those who give their time freely, thank you for your belief in BBBS and the difference we are making.

BBBS has given me the privilege of touching others' lives and making a difference. I have met countless amazing people, built relationships I couldn't have dreamed of, and as I leave to start the next chapter in my life I take with me incredible memories. For this, I am so grateful.



2022/2023 PROGRAMME EVALUATION

We use our Programme Outcome Evaluation (POE) tool annually to evaluate the impact mentoring is having on our young people. To ensure the robustness of results we ask both parents/caregivers and mentors the same questions. Young people are given a different set of questions. We ask these questions twice per year and based on the previous six months' engagements. It is important to bear in mind when reading these results that for some young people on the programme not all areas assessed are necessarily areas that need to be improved on, nor are an area for growth.

Data below is from reports completed 1 July 2022 - 30 June 2023.

CONFIDENCE

- 94% of parents / caregivers reported an increase in their child's self-confidence
- 89% of parents / caregivers saw an improvement in their child's decision-making abilities
- 86% of mentors reported an increase in their mentee's ability to express feelings
- 89% of parents / caregivers reported their child has a better sense of the future

COMPETENCE

- 73% of parents / caregivers reported increased classroom participation
- 73% of parents / caregivers saw improvements in academic performance
- 84% of parents / caregivers saw an improved attitude toward school

CARING

- 77% of parents / caregivers reported improved family and peer relationships
- 31% of young people said they get along better with family
- 35% of young people have fewer problems at school
- 54% of young people said they get angry less often

MENTEE FEEDBACK

- 97% of young people say their relationship with their mentor is important to them
- 86% of young people say their mentor has good ideas to help them solve problems
- 97% of young people say their mentor helps them take their mind off other things

BBBS FUNDRAISING TASK GROUP

THE BIG DRESS UP

We held our inaugural Big Dress Up fundraiser with Ebbett Park School and Te Kura Reo Rua o Maraenui / Maraenui Bilingual School participating. It was awesome to hear stories from the ākonga / students about who they look up to.

MENTOR TRAINING

Four times per year we bring together our new mentors for a training session on everything to do with being a Big Brother or Big Sister. We cover relationship building, risk management, child protection, match longevity and so much more. This strong foundation coupled with monthly supervision is designed to set the matches up for success.

INFORMATION SESSIONS

This year we have seen success in hosting information sessions for would-be mentors. We started with online sessions and then braved in-person events. We were excited with the number of people who came along and learned more, then decided to leap to become a mentor.

TEEN TALKS

Learning and upskilling are so important. Some of our mentors were fortunate to be able to attend the Teen Brain Talk hosted by Nathan Wallis. BBBS National Practice Manager, Matt Button, hosted a Teens Talk for our mentors. Feedback was resounding on how much was learned that could support matches as our young people transition from puberty into their teens.

MATCH SUPERVISION

One of the rewarding parts of being a Mentor Coordinator is individual supervision (checking in each month with mentors, mentees and whānau). We get to hear how matches are developing and often hear about the milestones that mentees are achieving. We also host Group Supervision sessions, which are an opportunity for mentors to come together to share wins and challenges.

NATIONAL HUI 2023

The team was fortunate to attend an action-packed Hui this year in Ōtautahi, Christchurch. Thank you to Taradale & District RSA and Gwen Malden Charitable Trust for your donations that helped us get to the conference.

BOARD MOVEMENTS

We thank Alexandra Ensor for her year on our Board, and also as a mentor with BBBS for five years! Strengthening our Police presence on the Board is Senior Sergeant Craig Vining. We also welcome Cherie Hannam, General Manager at Bramwell Bate, to the Board as Secretary. We look forward to their knowledge and drive to support the governance of BBBS over the coming years.

STRENGTHENING PARTNERSHIPS AND SHARING OUR PROGRAMME

This year we have been busy strengthening partnerships with community organisations, including the New Zealand Police, to whom we are very grateful for their support. MATCH HIGHLIGHTS

Ant and LJ - matched 18 July 2022

LJ (Mentee): "I like going out with Ant and doing lots of fun things. He's cool. We even built a cornhole set for the family to use. Ant is fun and caring, we often talk a lot, and there is nothing I would change."

Ant (Mentor): "LJ is a great kid, he has developed a lot more interest in hobbies. LJ shows a lot more trust towards me than when we first met and seeing his confidence grow is a real highlight. I have learned to be a better listener since being matched with LJ."

Sammie-Jo (Aunt): "I am so happy with how things are going between Ant and LJ. LJ always looks forward to seeing Ant every week and comes home excited to tell me what has happened in their time spent together. LJ thoroughly enjoys the one-on-one time spent with Ant."











MATCH SPONSOR



Leo (Mentee): "Jan is a great mentor. We play lots of different sports together, or cook, which I really enjoy. We are really close, and his kids even know me as "Uncle Leo". I feel really safe and comfortable with Jan."

Jan (Mentor): "It's been great to see Leo grow over the time we've been matched; he's becoming a lot more independent and confident in himself. It feels good to be that steady presence in his life, that he will be able to reflect on as he gets older. It has been a joy getting to know Leo, and being a mentor has helped my own personal growth as well."

Donna (Nan): "It's amazing seeing Jan and Leo together. They are always trying something new, and often end up developing a new passion. Since having a mentor, Leo has really come out of his shell, and always talks a lot about how much he enjoys his time with Jan. Jan is an amazing role model, and it's just such a perfect match."

MATCH HIGHLIGHTS

ALASTAIR AND SHANE - matched 5 April 2022

Shane (Mentee): "Al is a good guy and I really like him, having Al as a mentor is fun! I feel safe with Alastair, I don't get tired when we go out anymore. He is a cool dog man, he gives me lots of advice - like good ideas to remember."

Alastair (Mentor): "Shane is like part of the family now, just chatting away like another family member. He will often say things like 'I'm not shy now, eh Al?' Shane is a very empathetic and polite young man".

Patsy (Nan): "Shane's confidence has improved a lot. He enjoys going for walks and bike rides with Al. Post Cyclone, the match went on hold for a short while. When Shane got home from school one day, he was so excited, he said, 'Guess what very special person visited me at school today, Nan?' I was naming all kinds of famous people... Shane said, 'No Nan, Al came and visited me!' It has been lovely to watch their relationship flourish." Read more on their Cyclone Story on page 13.

PAUL AND JUREL - matched 11 September 2022

Jurel (Mentee): "I love hanging out with Paul. One day I hope to be a builder like Paul or a truck driver. Paul should have two jobs - one being a builder and the other being a mechanic. One day I would like to build a gokart together. I have even learned how to change a tyre."

Paul (Mentor): "I enjoy being a mentor; I get as much out of doing this as Jurel, it is a two-way thing. He is a neat kid. We often spend time hanging out, having an ice-cream, and chatting about cars."

Aimee (Nan): "It has been so great between Paul and Jurel; it could not be any better, Paul always keeps his word and spends quality time with Jurel. Jurel is a typical boy; he loves doing blokey stuff. I'm thrilled he has been matched with Paul who takes him out to do physical things. Jurel is totally excited to see Paul all the time and that pleases me so much. He is enjoying school and making better choices, he is even trying rugby."

Isaiah (Mentee): "Adam has taught me new tricks on my scooter. I like playing basketball and going to the playground. Adam makes me laugh, he is kind and a gentleman. I look forward to spending time with Adam."

Adam (Mentor): "Isaiah is a great kid who has become one of my friends. It has been awesome to see his confidence grow and to see his fun, curious and caring personality shine through. It has been very rewarding being Isaiah's mentor."

Ashlee (Mum): "Adam has had an amazing influence on Isaiah, he is solid, consistent and is a perfect role model. Having Adam in his life has given Isaiah an opportunity to understand how a male can interact with children and females. Adam has given Isaiah a fantastic range of experiences and activities. Isaiah has a lot more confidence and he has learnt to control his emotions."

CYCLONE GABRIELLE

Cyclone Gabrielle had a profound and life-changing effect on many of the people in our community and directly on some of our mentors, mentees and their whānau.

As soon as modes of communication were back up and running our BBBS team was quick to check in with every mentee's whānau and also the mentors. We sought to understand what had occurred for them and how best we could offer support. We sourced and collated documentation for our mentors to help them support their mentees dealing with the trauma of the day/s and into the future. We also collated a well-received website of helpful links for our mentors and families.

Post-cyclone, we have reviewed and updated our Emergency Planning Guidelines, paying careful attention to what actions a mentor can take if they are out and about with their mentee and all forms of communication are lost, or if they become stranded due to infrastructure breakdowns.

Cleaning up in the aftermath, supporting whānau and friends, and trying to reinstate a sense of normality is overwhelming. We acknowledge that the effects of Cyclone Gabrielle will continue to be far-reaching, and our team seek to upskill in Trauma Informed Practice so we can provide the best supervision for all our matches.

We continue to liaise closely with social workers and the school community to understand the best way Big Brothers Big Sisters can work with our tamariki. Further, we are hosting additional mentor information sessions to recruit more mentors in anticipation of the influx of mentee referrals.





AL AND SHANE'S STORY

Matched in April 2022, Al (mentor) and Shane (mentee) have had a match that is typical of many. Shane's Nan Patsy says that "Al is doing a marvellous job, Shane's attitude is improving and he doesn't get as grumpy anymore."

Shane says, "Al is a good guy and having him as a mentor is fun."

Then the cyclone hit. Al and his family were significantly impacted and the match was put on hold. This did not last long as about 3-weeks post-cyclone Al was visiting Shane at his school and talking to him about what had transpired, most significantly the loss of his beloved dogs; dogs who Patsy believes were critical in developing the bond that Al and Shane now have.

What is heart-warming to see is how Al and Shane's friendship has strengthened through this adversity. Shane has been regularly on-site helping Al with the clean-up.

Al says, "My Little Brother has not only supported me with putting in the hard yards, but he also puts his hand on my shoulder and says, 'Are you alright Al?' He knows it's been a tough time."

Clinical psychologist Catherine Gallagher says, "Getting involved in the clean-up can help give children a sense of control over the situation".
